Program Goals and Objectives

1. Students in the English B.A. program should acquire both general and specialized knowledge in their field, as well as develop academic skills in preparation for careers in academia, education, and a number of ALTAC careers.
2. B.A. students should also gain professionalization skills and knowledge in preparation for going on the job market or applying to graduate programs.
3. B.A. students should be able to complete their degrees in a timely fashion.

Learning Outcomes

Learning Outcomes

1. B.A. students should demonstrate a comprehensive knowledge of literary works in the English language, from the Medieval Period to the present. This knowledge should include a basic understanding of broad concepts such as genres, periods, and movements as well as a familiarity with a variety of individual texts that exemplify these concepts.
2. B.A. students should be able to demonstrate knowledge of and an appreciation for diversity, specifically as it relates to a wide range of English-speaking cultures.
3. B.A. students should possess skills for the appreciation and critical reading of literary texts, including a general knowledge of techniques of literary analysis and criticism, and be able to use these techniques to write intelligently about literature.
4. B.A. students should be able to analyze, create, and defend complex arguments in correct and rhetorically effective written English.
5. B.A. students majoring only in English should be able to complete their degrees in 4 years; B.A. students with additional majors should be able to complete their degrees in 4 to 5 years, depending upon number and type of additional majors.
6. Graduating B.A. students should be able to secure employment, or to pursue additional education, that will aid them in developing professional careers.

Description and justification of the request

Description of specific change	Justification for this change
Adding online/web-based delivery to program delivery.	<p>The English B.A. program is designed for students to acquire both general and specialized knowledge required for the advanced study of English literature. In addition to developing research and pedagogical skills in preparation for careers in academia, the English major provides one of the very best preparations for a number of AL-TAC (“alternative to academic”) careers, including legal, governmental, journalist, advertising and marketing careers, indeed all professions that require both critical thinking and writing expertise. In order to serve a more inclusive student body, our recently redesigned English major at UAF offers the option of three different, though complementary concentrations: a traditional concentration on literary analysis and interpretation but more focused on a variety of particular topics, a concentration on Rhetoric and Writing, and a concentration on Creative Writing. Offering these same concentrations on-line would greatly assist students to complete their degree requirements in a timely fashion. We also anticipate that offering the UAF English major on-line would greatly increase the number of students both within and without the state who are eager and will now be able to earn a quality BA majoring in English.</p>

Alice Griffin (agriffin) (10/30/20 8:07 am): Removed ENGL 3103 from the concentration requirements. This course is now an overall requirement for the program. Changing the total hours for the concentration from 21 to 18, per request of submitter.

Alice Griffin (agriffin) (10/30/20 11:47 am): While the additions to the eight semester plan for the General Education Curriculum may be processed administratively, the addition of the online offering will require campus approval for the concentration. The BA program will require off campus approval.

Alice Griffin (agriffin) (11/03/20 4:47 pm): After further review, the department requested to add three hours back to the concentration to total 21 hours. Changed nine to 12 hours in the course selection above and added the option to the fourth year spring semester in the eight semester plan. The college is encouraged to review these changes for accuracy.
